Driving positive change in cocoa farming communities

What is Cocoa Horizons?

The majority of the global cocoa crop is produced by smallholder farmers in remote equatorial regions. Smallholder cocoa farmers face considerable economic, social and environmental challenges such as limited resources to invest in their farm, aging cocoa trees, soil degradation, the effects of climate change, and often a lack of essential infrastructure such as access to clean water, electricity, paved roads, or high quality education.

To tackle these issues and support cocoa farming communities, Barry Callebaut established the Cocoa Horizons Foundation in 2015. Its mission is to improve the livelihoods of cocoa farmers through the promotion of sustainable and entrepreneurial farming practices, and to strengthen systems in cocoa communities ensuring that nature and children are protected.

The program operates in 7 countries through Barry Callebaut entities. In Côte d'Ivoire, we also collaborate with Touton and Sucden to expand our reach.

Transparency and impact are central to Cocoa Horizons. That is why each year we publish an independently audited report detailing progress against our goals, and how funds are used to achieve tangible results for farming communities.

Executive Summary

In the first half of the year, ongoing challenges in the cocoa sector highlighted the urgent need to secure future supply and strenghten the resilience of both cocoa farms and farming communities. Lower crop yields and challenging buying conditions led to reduced cocoa deliveries and purchases, significantly impacting volume-related KPIs. Despite this, Cocoa Horizons continued to collaborate closely with farmers, achieving solid progress in key areas:

- Traceability & EUDR: 97% full data collection on farmers, a milestone towards full traceability, and compliance with the upcoming EUDR (European Union Deforestation Regulation) legislation.
- Agroforestry: Millions of quality shade tree seedlings were produced across regions in Cocoa Horizons nurseries and will be delivered to cocoa farmers and cooperatives by end of the year.
- Cocoa Swollen Shoot Virus Disease (CSSVD): 100 hectare established to test best practices that can fight and prevent the virus.
- Human Rights: Cocoa Horizons partnered with three international child rights organizations to promote our holistic community systems approach and target underlying enablers of child labor. Additionally, Cocoa Horizons enabled Integrated Child Protection Case Management to work closely with formal Child Protection structures.

We remain strong in our belief and commitment to scaling impact and driving change in cocoa farming communities.




















Prospering farmers

Historically high global cocoa prices topped with cocoa shortage mainly due to changing weather patterns, diseases and lack of investment are the reasons behind the difficult start of the year. Cocoa Horizons is embracing this uncertainty and continues its work to enhance farmer livelihoods and sustainable cocoa farming practices.

Less training, more doing.

We continue our action-oriented strategy:

Farm Business Plans (FBPs):

 68,387 tailored recommendations were made during one to one coaching visits to farmers on how to optimize yield on their cocoa farms. Despite a 27% decrease in FBP compared to the previous year, we expect a

pick up of FBPs in the next half of the year.

 Productivity Packages: the value of productivity

the value of productivity packages in boosting yields and income, particularly with the right application of fertilizers and insecticides is increasingly recognized among farmers. To maximize impact, we are timing distribution to coincide with the rainy season. This year, the late arrival of the rain delayed the distribution of packages, hence the 60% decrease vs prior year.

Cocoa Seedling Distribution:
 For the first time since 2018, Cocoa Horizons is raising and distributing cocoa seedlings for a cocoa regeneration effort in Côte d'Ivoire. 1.3 million cocoa seedlings have

been raised and the distribution is due in the second half of the year.

CSSV pilot

In the last years there has been an increased incidence of cocoa swollen shoot virus disease (CSSVD) in Côte d'Ivoire. The virus is estimated to potentially threaten 15-20% of the country's cocoa production in the next decade. Cocoa Horizons established a 100 hectare pilot project to provide a comprehensive framework to fight against CSSVD in selected areas with increased disease pressure.

Income Generating Activities
 We significantly raised the support for income diversification and income generation activities to reach 5,803 community members and foster greater economic resilience within cocoa communities. IGAs have demonstrated positive results in providing income diversification for farmers, particularly during off-peak seasons.

Looking Ahead

For the remainder of the year, our focus will be on scaling pre-harvest support, ramping up Farm Business Plans, and distributing the majority of productivity packages and quality seedlings. All this will be guided by farmer data, allowing us to tailor services more effectively to the evolving needs of cocoa communities.

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We did all this work, raising 1,3 million cocoa seedlings.
We start by washing the received cocoa seeds. Then once they germinate we saw them.
The best part comes when the seedlings start to grow. I love the little greens coming up, that is really inspiring and nice for me.

Empowered Communities

Strengthening Systems

Our new human rights strategy is in full swing. We are transitioning from an approach focused on monitoring and detection —based on child labor monitoring through individual household member surveys— towards a child protection approach focused on **prevention and response.**

Farm Observation Survey

This half of the fiscal year, we continued piloting our tool called Farm Observation Survey (FOS) across the four sourcing countries in Africa. We trained our staff and coaches on observing and identifying child labor and other potential human rights risks and concerns in the field. The training also focused on communication skills to support the implementation of the farm observation survey to verify, mitigate and address human rights violations through a conversation with cocoa producers.

Integrated Child Protection Case Management

In the previous year (2023/2024), we started partnering with expert organizations in Côte d'Ivoire, Ghana and Cameroon to promote Integrated Child Protection Case Management working in collaboration with local authorities

(formal child protection services). Through our NGO partners, we build the capacity and support the child protection case management procedure of the local child protection structures.

• Community Systems Strengthening
In FY 2024/25, we kicked off our
Community Systems Approach across
Côte d'Ivoire, Ghana, and Nigeria with an
outreach of a total of 31,028 adults
(directly and indirectly) and 34,725
children (directly and indirectly). The
approach is built around five
interconnected components (see graph
on the next page) that help establish a
protective environment for children. By
improving resilience to structural
vulnerabilities, it tackles the root causes
and drivers of child labor in a sustainable
and locally anchored way.

Looking Ahead

Ultimately, our goal is to continue refining our approach to mobilize more resources toward preventing and mitigating child labor and toward creating an environment where children are empowered and protected and aware of their rights and are active in shaping their community.

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Our cocoa farm has been included in the Cocoa Horizons program, which is one of our steps toward practicing sustainable agriculture. I am actively involved in a business group called "IGA Kuajang", an initiative driven by women farmers in our village. Together, we process and market packaged coffee. We believe that small businesses like ours are not just about selling products. They are our way of preserving heritage, strengthening the role of women in rural areas, and planting hope for a more independent future by increasing additional income for our members.

Thriving Nature

Halfway through the year, Cocoa Horizons continues to progress towards a traceable and deforestation-free cocoa supply chain.

We have reached a milestone in traceability and continue with our robust agroforestry plan to manage shade and raising farmer awareness on environmental protection.

Traceability

We are very close to our traceability target, achieving 97% coverage in full data collection across member farmers. Flagged plots for potential deforestation are receiving on-site field inspections and only plots with complete and accurate information are eligible for Cocoa Horizons validation. Cocoa Horizons cocoa will comply with the EU Deforestation Free regulation (EUDR) requirements by the end of 2025.

Agroforestry

The enhanced rate of agroforestry adoption among cocoa farmers also helps the diversification of farming household income. Each planted tree is monitored by Cocoa Horizons and Payments for Environmental Services are distributed for thriving trees.

Shade management

To increase cocoa resilience to climate change it is essential to find the right balance in shade. Too little shade leads to increased heat stress, soil degradation and disease outbreaks, while too much shade can reduce cocoa yields. Cocoa Horizons is supporting cocoa farmers to find the right balance on their farms and distributes a variety of fruit and forest trees to farmers and cooperatives.

tooking ahead

We continue to improve our agroforestry efforts and build digital tools for post planting and seedling monitoring. Seedling distribution will peak in the rainy season to optimize survival rates.

Furthermore, our established robust deforestation-free due diligence process is supporting our partners in meeting EUDR standards and ensuring our journey toward a sustainable and compliant future remains both impactful and effective.

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The key benefit of agroforestry is, that it allows us to preserve nature, naturally. If we don't have big trees in cocoa farms to protect the plantation from the harsh effects of climate change, the cocoa trees will die. We have practiced agroforesty methods in the past—though in a more traditional way. Now, with Cocoa Horizons we're working in a modern context, collaborating and exchanging ideas.

Our Forest Positive Approach and EUDR

Next to our efforts on traceability and agroforestry, and in partnership with Barry Callebaut, we are taking significant steps to meet our forest-positive objectives and comply with EUDR due diligence requirements.

Cocoa Horizons follows Barry Callebaut's comprehensive risk assessment approach, evaluating risks at country, regional, supplier, and farm levels. Additionally, supply chain tools to assess and mitigate risks of non-compliance are embedded into the various sourcing steps of Cocoa Horizons products.

This robust due diligence approach, coupled with investment in forest protection in landscapes where cocoa is at high risk of being associated with non-compliance for EUDR, ensures that Barry Callebaut will demonstrate no or negligible risk of non-compliance for Cocoa Horizons products from high-risk countries entering the EU market.


